Write and connect with the children

The letters allow donors to connect personally with the children and learn about their home life, schooling, and dreams for the future. Enabling donors to provide emotional, as well as financial, support to the community.



Receive regular photo updates from the community

1-2 times per year, donors receive activity reports and photographs of the Pen Pals from the community site. Highlighting the children's growth and outcome of the project through the donation.



Opportunities to meet with Pen Pals

FTCJ also offers supporters the opportunity to visit the community site, which may be difficult to visit as a tourist. Meeting with Pen Pals and experiencing the rich natural beauty of the Philippines.

Issues Faced By the Communities We Support

In the rich natural environment of Luzon, the Northern region of the Philippines, there is an indigenous Aeta community. The Aeta people heavily rely on natural resources for their basic necessities but have seen a depletion of resources due to climate change and urban development in the region. They now face challenges related to poverty, like malnourishment. Research indicates that around 80% of children from the community are born underweight. Not only does the lack of nutrition affect their physical development, but it also hinders their ability to receive a proper education. Children without consistent access to proper nutrition may be unable to concentrate in school or miss school regularly due to illness. In 2025, FTCJ launched its Pen Pal Supporter program to create an environment in which children can receive quality education. The first step? To provide elementary school students with school lunches, in cooperation with local partner organization, the Preda Foundation.



FAQs

- What language should I write the letter in?
 You can write your letters in English, Japanese, or Tagalog (Filipino)! If
 you prefer to write the letter in Japanese, FTCJ has an online submission
 form (see more details through the QR code below). Please avoid sending
 handwritten letters in Japanese to ensure a smooth translation process
 from Japanese to Tagalog.
- Do I have to write a letter to support the community?

 No, writing letters is not mandatory for project supporters. You can write and send letters when it is convenient for you. Currently, half of the community's supporters do not write letters.
- Can I receive a donation deduction 「寄付控除」for my taxes?
 Yes! FTCJ has been a certified NPO 「認定NPO法人」since March 16, 2012. You can receive a tax deduction when you submit the official receipt that will be issued to you by FTCJ for your donation.
- Can I stop supporting in the middle of the fiscal year?

 Yes, this is possible. As this project relies heavily on donors' support, we strongly urge donors to commit to supporting the community for the full year. However, in the case where donors may feel unable to do so, FTCJ can assist in ending your donor partnership
